The Giant Sequoia

I promise not to bore you with our recent holiday photos. With the digital cameras we have now there is no stopping us, as to the hundreds of photographs we can produce on a fortnight's holiday. So if it's okay with you just one...

We were very fortunate in May to go on a trip we have dreamt about making for a long time to the Grand Canyon and Yosemite National Park in America. It was more than we could have imagined. In my one picture I offer you a spectacular tree, the Giant Sequoia, the world's largest single trees. This is taken near Yosemite National Park. These trees are almost graceful giants, wondrous to behold and your neck aches a little as you try and look up to where they reach.





They are also unusual in that they rely on periodic wild fires to effectively grow new

seedlings. The fires clear competing vegetation, and the hot air that comes with fires dries and opens the cones allowing the seeds to drop. The ash which covers the ground protects the fallen seeds.

In the Church's calendar we have just celebrated Pentecost which tells of the disciples receiving the Holy Spirit of God. In the Message version of the bible it describes the Holy Spirit not just as a strong gale force wind, but as being like a wild fire spreading amongst the disciples. After this experience they are changed, they find new courage and conviction to go amongst the population and tell people of the love of Jesus. They grow in an amazing way as Jesus' disciples.

Perhaps as we come towards times of rest this summer we can ask God to show us, not through actual fire, how we can look at our lives and see what is competing against us, clutter or busyness in our lives, so that we can make

space to really grow to know God, ourselves and the potential that is given to each one of us.

The disciples and the Christian community as they grew learnt how to live together in a spectacularly generous way. Interestingly the giant sequoias can live in close proximity to one another. As their roots are shallow and they spread all around the group of other trees, and they share their resources with one another, together the roots make them stable.

When we get to that place of not being cluttered and into a place of release, then often we can find that our neighbours and friends are appreciated once again, that we have time and space to live with generosity and not defensiveness.

I hope that if you have holidays, or days out, or days of rest, that God will speak to you through the wonders of his creation, and that you may be blessed and refreshed by his love.

DISTRICT 6, Cape Town

John Wilkins visited District 6 during his recent visit to South Africa

Buitenkamp Street Methodist Church was just down the road from our hotel in Cape Town. It is an old-fashioned building, with a gallery round three sides and a high central pulpit. It used to have 700 members, drawn from the lively mixed community known as District 6.

But District 6 is close to the centre of Cape Town, and in 1966 the South African authorities declared it a whites only area. The 60,000 residents were to be moved to townships in the barren, windswept areas miles from the City.

The Church became a focus for resistance and challenge, but the houses were bulldozed and families dispersed. A man we spoke to was moved with his parents to one township, while his grandparents were sent to another and uncles and aunts to a



third. The aim, he said, was to break the spirit of the community. For a time the church kept the community alive, as those moved out travelled back to church on Sundays to see friends and families.



Times have changed now, and people can live where they choose. But property prices in District 6 are so high that the former residents cannot afford to move back, and continue to travel in to work from the distant townships. The church closed too, when all its congregation had moved away. But it is famous internationally now as a museum commemorating the people and community of District 6, and illustrating how the Methodist Church fought for truth and justice

through the troubled times of South Africa. Under God's guidance we must continue to do so. John Wilkins

Continuing the series about shops and organisations in Bents Green

The week before a bank holiday and half term is a busy one in a hairdressing salon. I went to meet Julie Tompkins in her salon at Bents Green in the week before Spring Bank holiday and just after school home time. Bents Green was busy and people were popping in to the salon with or without appointments to have their hair done or to see if their children could have a hair cut before the holiday. Tompkins Hair and Nail studio has a wide range of customers from small children through to people in their 90s.

Julie used to pass through Bents Green on her way to work at her salon at Bradwell. One day, 7 years ago, she had the thought that it would be a good place to have a hair salon. The next day, a Friday, she drove past and was amazed to see that this shop had a 'To Let' sign up. She rang up first



thing on Monday and has been here ever since. She loves the feeling of community at Bents Green. People know each other and are caring, asking after each other and noticing when someone hasn't been around. There is a good community spirit.



Julie has three salons which are in Bradwell, Bents Green and Hillsborough. She also has a bridal business which runs mainly through pop-up shops. It is advertised on Facebook. The service offers bridal dresses and also prom dresses and the stylists can come to the house, the hotel or the wedding venue. In preparation Julie offers a free trial at one of the salons.

The business employs 11 staff including her three daughters. Julie works one or two days a week at each of the salons. The stylists at Bents Green are Chloe, Katrina and Savannah with Julie here on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. The stylists are all trained to Level 3 standard in cutting and colouring and have barbering certificates. From time to time they undertake courses outside their own business which bring in new ideas which can be shared with all the stylists. One of the stylists is soon to go on a course for long hair and bridal styles. Julie stressed that you don't need to go into the city centre

to find well trained and talented stylists and her prices are more reasonable. Between cuts they offer free fringe trims and the senior 'treat' rate is available all week, including Saturdays.

Over the 7 years that the salon has been here, the staff have got to know their clients well. Many pop in for a chat or to sit and recover from walking up the hill. Sometimes stylists will give an elderly client a lift home after their appointment.

Julie and her staff are happy to support local events and last year they volunteered to do the hair for High Storrs School's production of Grease at the Lyceum Theatre. She will also literally go the extra mile, travelling to Cornwall when a client was getting married and didn't want to risk using another hairdresser. Julie added a few days on and made it a short, well-deserved holiday.

He is very happy and while he is currently working alongside other mechanics in different locations, he still is working towards realizing his dream of one day opening his own garage and we believe he will!

Malawi Floods

Devastating floods have drowned at least 170 people in our beloved Malawi this year and displaced more than 200,000 people! These storms and floods were worst in the month of January and targeted the Southern parts of the country though we had isolated heavy and destructive storms in other parts





of the country too. As a family we were able to send some maize to the South to help with food relief as the country rallied together, collecting donations of all kinds to transport to the worst hit areas.

Heavy floods washed away more than 64,000 hectares of cropland and therefore the price of maize is climbing which in turn affects the prices of other commodities and the economy of the country. Progress in Malawi is hard and slow as businesses are also greatly affected, including our own car hire as tourists and visitors to Malawi postpone their trips due to the country's situation.

We wish to take this opportunity to express our gratitude to you as a friend and partner of *Children with Hope And Destiny* over the many years! Your support in every way is not taken for granted, but so greatly appreciated. Raising a family like this is only

With a cargo of diamonds


